About the Students Commission of Canada

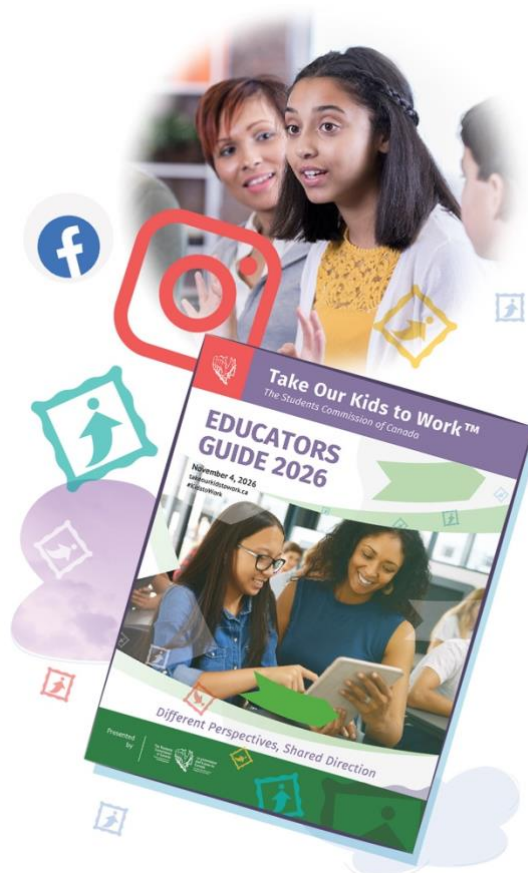

- Students can participate in Take Our Kids to Work Day hosted **in person** by employers in their area for school groups or for individual students accompanied by parents, relatives, caregivers or trusted adult allies
- Teachers and educators can lead students through a Take Our Kids to Work Day **at school**, using the SCC's resources, the live-streamed event and activities included in this guide.
- Students can participate in the virtual TOKW Career Live! event and do other career exploration activities **from home**.

BEFORE THE DAY

This section will guide you through the essential steps to ensure a smooth and valuable experience for your students. From setting clear learning goals aligned with this year's theme, to coordinating logistics and communication with parents and workplaces, we've got you covered. Remember, it's important to check with your school administration, school board, or district for any specific guidelines or requirements that may apply to your participation in TOKW. By following these steps, you'll be well-prepared to provide your students with a meaningful day of career exploration and inspiration.

Preparing the day

Set Clear Goals: Consider what you want your students to gain from TOKW. Align your goals with this year's theme, *Different Perspectives, Shared Direction* to inspire students to explore diverse careers and see their potential to make a positive impact. Reflect on how the day can help students appreciate the variety of employment opportunities, the role of different careers in society, and their own ability to shape their future. Encouraging students to look beyond traditional paths and think about how they can contribute to their communities can make TOKW a truly meaningful experience.

Adapting the Day: Consider how you can tailor TOKW to best fit the interests of your students and your own needs and capacities. Flexibility is key—feel free to adapt activities to suit your class dynamics, subject areas, and individual learning styles. Whether it's focusing on specific industries that intrigue your students or incorporating hands-on projects that align with your teaching style, customization can enhance the relevance and impact of the day. We've also prepared a curriculum example specifically **designed for students with learning disabilities** (see Appendix), ensuring that all students can participate meaningfully. By personalizing the experience, you can make TOKW a truly inclusive and engaging event for everyone.



Leverage Available Resources: Remember, you have a wealth of resources at your fingertips to help make Take Our Kids to Work Day (TOKW) a success.

- Many schools in Canada have memberships with educational platforms focused on career exploration, such as Xello, My Blueprint, Career Cruising, ChatterHigh, Skills Canada, EdgeFactor, Career Trek, Youth Explore Trades Skills, and Repères (in Québec). This event will allow students to explore various careers and ask questions in real-time.

We encourage you to support your child's participation in this valuable event. If possible, arrange for them to visit your workplace or another suitable location. If this isn't feasible, they can join the virtual event from home or at school.

Take Our Kids to Work Sample Agenda

TIME *	ACTIVITY
9:00-9:15 AM	Welcome and Introduction to the Day Begin the day with a warm welcome and overview of the day's activities. Introduce the theme: Different Directions, Shared Perspectives • Activity: Show the cornerstone video to set the stage and inspire students.
9:15-10:00 AM	Self-Reflection Activity • Activity: Your Personal Brand (see appendix) – Have youth reflect on what matters most to them: characteristics, attributes, skills, interests or personality traits that could influence their career choice.
10:00-10:15 AM	Break
10:15-11:00 AM	Career Exploration Activities • Activity 1: Career Exploration Stations – Set up different stations in the classroom, each focusing on a specific career or industry. Include interactive elements such as virtual tours, industry facts, and role-playing activities.



TIME *	ACTIVITY
10:15-11:00 AM	Career Exploration Activities • Activity 2: Resume Building Workshop – Teach students the basics of resume writing and have them start drafting their own resumes. Provide templates and examples to guide them.
11:00 AM-12:00 PM	TOKW Career Live! Drop-In Join the TOKW Career Live! for a special interview segment with an industry expert. Students can ask questions and learn about different career paths. • Activity: Have students prepare a few questions in advance and participate in the live Q&A.
12:00-12:45 PM	Lunch
12:45-2:00PM	Interactive Career Workshops • Activity 1: Career Interest Inventory – Have students complete a career interest inventory to identify their strengths and preferences. • Activity 2: Group Discussions – Break into small groups and discuss various career paths based on interests. Each group can present their findings and reflections.
2:00-2:45 PM	Reflect and Share • Activity: Reflect on the day's activities and discussions. Have students share what they learned and found most interesting. Encourage them to think about how the day's experiences might influence their future career choices.
2:45-3:00 PM	Wrap-Up and Conclusion Summarize the day's activities and highlight key takeaways. Distribute participant certificates to celebrate their engagement and participation.

Reflection Activities

Educators can also encourage students to discuss what they learned, what excited them, and any challenges they faced. These activities are designed to facilitate meaningful conversations and individual reflections, helping students connect their TOKW experiences with their future career aspirations.

Provides a wide array of resources and tools on youth-driven topics that can help build employability skills and knowledge.

Offers various resources and activities focused on career development during Canada Career Month, typically held in November.

Government of Canada Job Bank

Provides a wealth of information on job trends, employment prospects, and career planning tools, including quizzes and assessments.

Skills Canada

Offers resources for exploring careers in skilled trades and technologies, including videos, interactive activities, and information on skills competitions.

Career Cruising – Free Trial

Offers a free trial version where students can explore career profiles, take interest and skills assessments, and learn about educational pathways.

ACTIVITIES

Interest and Skills Assessments

Students can take free interest and skills assessments to identify potential career paths based on their strengths and preferences.

Career Research Projects

Tools: Indeed, Workopolis, Joblllico

Assign students to research different careers, including job responsibilities, required education, salary, and employment outlook. They can present their findings to the class.

Mock Interviews and Resume Workshops

Conduct mock interviews and resume-building workshops to help students prepare for real-world job applications and interviews.

Career Pathways Mapping

Have students map out potential career pathways for their chosen careers, including the necessary education, skills, and experience required at each step. You could make a class map for a broader overview.

YouthJobs Canada

This 5-to-10-minute quiz will help students to determine where their aptitudes can be applied into specific job types.

When I Grow Up – Career Lesson and Activities

Career exploration curriculum with multiple ready-to-use activities to place career decisions and knowledge in action through application.



Activities

PRE-EVENT

Thinking about your “personal brand”

This activity helps students think about the characteristics and traits they possess that comprise their “personal brand.” What is the unique combination of skills, experience, and personality that they have and want the world – and a future employer! – to see?

Step 1:

Ask students to think of some well-known brands (e.g., clothing, mobile phones, cars). What qualities or features do they identify with each brand? How does each brand differ?

Step 2:

Ask students to think about anyone they know who has a personal brand, such as a celebrity or famous influencer or family member. How would they describe that person’s brand? How does it distinguish them from other people?

Step 3:

Ask students to think about their own personal brand. Using the characteristics/qualities they generated in Steps 1 and 2, or adding new ones of their own, have the students list their own unique qualities, skills, attributes, interests and personal traits that comprise their “personal brand.” Ask them to think about how these qualities/attributes show up in the world. How do they express these qualities in their activities, behaviour, personal style?

Step 4:

Have students find or create an idea board, drawing, collage, video, story or social media post that they think reflects their personal brand.

TIP

Extension Idea: Following Take Our Kids to Work Day, ask students to identify a company (i.e., a brand) they encountered during their experience. Repeat Step 1. Ask the student if, and how, the employees that they met demonstrated the company’s brand and what impact that had on their impression of the company.

- Are there any skills or qualifications you currently lack that might be difficult to obtain?

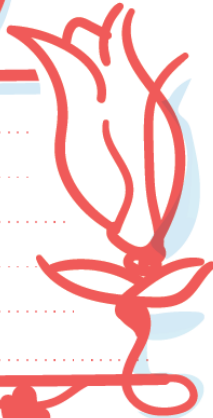

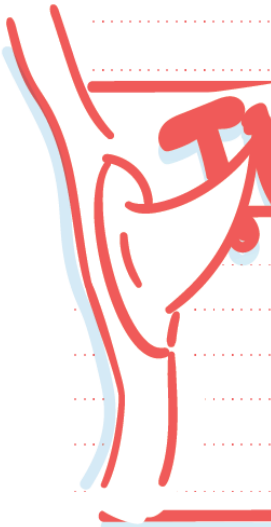

Take Our Kids to Work Adapted for Students with Disabilities

There are different ways in which TOKW can be adapted to suit various needs and developmental stages. We have put together a few examples of accessibility adaptations that could be made during the day, keeping in mind that there is a large spectrum of disabilities and related needs. We are hoping that these suggested adaptations will spark some creativity and give you initial tools to create a memorable day for all the students. **Please note that pre-recorded videos provided by the Students Commission of Canada will be closed captioned.**

ADAPTED ACTIVITY IDEAS

Career Exploration Station:

- **Materials:** Job role cards, visual aids, interactive apps.
- **Description:** Set up stations with different career-related materials where students can explore and interact with job roles through pictures and hands-on tools.

Accessible Job Role Interviews:

- **Description:** Allow students to participate in interviews or shadowing school staff members such as the janitor, school nurse, counsellor, librarian, administrative assistant, etc. You could have students brainstorming their own questions earlier in the day or in the week or provide them with an existing list of questions.
- **Other option:** You could have a job scavenger hunt within the school. Provide your students with a list of simple job descriptions or tasks and ask them to find the school staff associated with the description/tasks.

Partnership with Local Accessible Companies

- **Description:** Having students tour local companies that might have the potential to hire them in the future can help them start the career exploration journey. For example, partnering with local grocery stores, post office, community kitchen or library could give students a glimpse into realistic job opportunities.



Role-Playing Game:

- **Materials:** Props, costumes, role-play scripts.
- **Description:** Create scenarios where students can act out different job roles, using props and costumes to make the experience interactive. For example, students could be running a “restaurant” or “grocery store” in the classroom. Provide step-by-step guides or visual storyboards that break down the concept into manageable parts.

Exploration of Personal Strengths and Skills

- **Description:** Conduct a skills assessment activity using tools and methods that accommodate different needs, such as interactive online assessments, hands-on activities, or visual aids. Offer multiple ways for students to express their skills, including through drawing, writing, or verbal communication.
- **Example:** Have students select in advance a career they are interested in and use accessible resources to research the skills required. Create a worksheet with the list of skills required and ask students to list their current skills and identify areas for growth. Provide examples of how these skills align with different careers.

Reflective Art Activity:

- **Materials:** Paper, markers, stickers, or other craft supplies.
- **Description:** Students create drawings or collages to reflect on their day, representing their favorite parts, challenges, and future interests. It could also be a vision board illustrating the job they see themselves in.

Kindness Acts Bingo Job (Credit: [TODAS Grade 2-5 Facilitator Guide](#))

- **Materials:** A copy of the bingo page for each student and something to mark it up (e.g.: game chips, paper clips, stickers, markers, etc.)
- **Description:** Using a copy of the bingo page, read out the different acts of kindness at random, noting which ones you have read. Students who have committed that random act of kindness will cover the square after it is read. The winner is the first person to complete a row across, up and down, or diagonally through the middle. That way, they can learn more about how kind actions and words can create a better place to live and work.
- **Other Resource:** Here is another version of a [Careers bingo](#) that can be purchased.

9:00-9:30 AM	Welcome and Introduction to the Day Begin with a simple and engaging introduction to TOKW using visual aids and straightforward language. Use a large-print or audio version of the agenda to help students understand the day's schedule. • Activity: Show the Cornerstone video to set the stage and inspire students.
9:30-10:30 AM	Interactive Career Exploration Activity • Activity: Use hands-on materials or interactive apps to explore different careers. For instance, create a "Career Exploration Station" with various career-related tools and resources, such as job role cards with pictures and simple descriptions.
10:30-10:45 AM	Break
10:45-12:00 AM	School Tour • Activity 1: Have students tour the school and learn more about different school staff's roles. • Activity 2: Job Scavenger Hunt - Provide the students with simple job descriptions or tasks and have them find out which school staff they are associated with.
12:00-12:45 PM	Lunch
12:45-2:00PM	Creative Expression Activity • Activity: Allow students to create a visual project about their favorite career explored during the day, such as a poster or a collage. Provide materials such as markers, glue, and images for them to use.
2:00-2:45 PM	Reflect and Share • Activity: Conclude with a group discussion where students can share their thoughts and experiences. Use visual aids and provide prompts to help guide the conversation. They can even share back their collage to other classmates.
2:45-3:00 PM	Wrap-Up and Conclusion Summarize the day's activities and highlight key takeaways. Distribute participant certificates to celebrate their engagement and participation.
